

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


Atmospheric CO₂ is higher now than at any time in the past 200,000 years of human history

- In addition, CO₂ levels have been lower than 400 ppm for the past 23 million years
- The **speed** of this change is critical; it is > 100x faster than before the Industrial Revolution
- At this rate, adaptation of living things becomes difficult, if not impossible



Why can't we get a handle on climate change?

- climate change is a symptom, not the problem
- the problem is ecological overreach, and to address this, we need to change the way we live

Climate change in the era of Trump and DOGE



Overarching Goals of Trump/DOGE

unrestrained executive power

privatization

dismantling civil service

largest data breach in human history

hostility to all federal regulation, especially environmental

"They're eating the checks, they're eating the balances"

attacks on civil service (administrative leave, mass firings, RIFs)

attacks on oversight bodies (MSPB, OSC, IG, unions, etc.)

judiciary not equipped to address this level of illegality

SCOTUS deferential to Trump/executive power

What are they saying?

- Zeldin: Spending money on climate change is "inexcusable, unjustifiable and illegitimate."
- Johnson: "They have cracked the code. They're inside the belly of the beast of the bureaucracy, and the algorithms are crawling through."
- Trump: "It costs much more to do things environmentally clean."
- Musk: "The risk is not as high as a lot of people say it is with respect to global warming. But I think if you just keep increasing the parts per million in the atmosphere long enough, eventually it actually simply gets uncomfortable to breathe."

What is the forecast?

Trump now going after states and municipalities: directed DOJ to block all "burdensome and ideologically motivated 'climate change' or energy policies that threaten American energy dominance and our economic and national security."



NOAA Hit by DOGE Cuts

- NOAA has been targeted with climate science and weather office staffing cuts, now nearly ALL RESEARCH is likely being cut
- Weather forecasting has been particularly impacted
- Coastal communities and climate resilience are at risk from poor forecasting and cuts in grant funding

Attacks are Political, Not Science

- Weather forecasts and forecasters are NOT making forecasts political – they serve all communities and all states – RED AND BLUE

2. Perceived Risks of Global Warming

1. Global Warming Beliefs

1.1 Most Americans think global warming is happening.

Americans who think global warming is happening outnumber those who think it is not by a ratio of about 5 to 1.

Seven in ten Americans (73%) think global warming is happening. By contrast, only 14% of Americans think global warming is not happening. Additionally, 14% say they don't know if global warming is happening (refer to data tables, p. 26).

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Critical Science at Risk

- NOAA science serves the public (e.g., weather forecasts, fisheries information, nautical charts, tides & currents data) and is available for free
- It is a lean agency (e.g., one person in the Pacific NW is responsible for the longevity of salmon hatcheries)

NOAA Staffing Cuts Threaten Years of Salmon Harvests

In Washington, where salmon is a multibillion dollar industry, government staff terminations and budget freezes may put salmon production at risk.

April 9, 2025

In Washington State, April is when millions of young Chinook salmon are released from hatcheries, where they started as tiny, pink globes, to swim downstream and rebuild the salmon population. They are part of an ecosystem that affects tribal, commercial, and recreational fishing and are a main source of food

- Private weather apps use weather data collected by the government
- More frequent extreme weather requires accurate, timely forecasts
- These are NOT natural disasters as the media often portrays, but human-caused



Prior to January 20, 2025:

Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) and Bipartisan Infrastructure Act (BIL) funding: ~ \$110,000,000,000 invested through EPA

- E-school buses; wind; solar; geothermal; weatherization; heat pumps; batteries; EVs; charging infrastructure; etc.
- Justice 40: underserved and overburdened communities; righting past wrongs
- Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund Green Banks \$20B
