- We engage in scientific endeavors not only for the sake of knowledge, but also for the sake of building a better world for everyone.






Science Under Authoritarianism


- Independent and government scientists silenced/fired
- Research, funding, and collaboration are controlled/eliminated
- Facts twisted
- Fake science is pushed
- Uncertainty is weaponized





Repercussions of science under authoritarianism

- Public health and the environment are at risk
- No scientific integrity
- Brain drain
- Science becomes a tool to keep ruling party in power
