



Thank you for your commitment to our public lands!

PEER needs people like you to write to the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and engage in the process of developing regulations that manage our public lands. Click [here](#) to see the new grazing regulation, *Revisions of Regulations for Grazing Administration, Exclusive of Alaska*. These regulations have enormous flaws—they reduce public oversight, weaken accountability for land health problems, and remove important environmental safeguards.

The proposed regulations could make it more difficult to address the very conditions driving biodiversity loss across the West. Degraded streams and wetlands can harm native fish and amphibians. Overgrazed riparian areas can eliminate critical habitat for migratory birds. The spread of invasive grasses can increase wildfire frequency and destroy habitat for species already in decline.

The proposal would also make it more difficult for conservation organizations, Tribal Nations, scientists, and members of the public to participate in decisions that affect wildlife and ecosystems on lands owned by all Americans.

Your letter is important! The decisions made today will shape the future of wildlife, clean water, and western landscapes for generations to come.

I am writing to comment on the dangerous new grazing regulation, *Revisions of Regulations for Grazing Administration, Exclusive of Alaska*. **Public lands belong to all Americans, and my interests in public lands are no less important than those of livestock operations.**

I am concerned that the proposed grazing regulations will:

- **Fail to do enough to protect and restore native plants and seeds on BLM-managed public lands.** Healthy native plant communities are essential to land health. The proposed rule recognizes the importance of vegetation, plant establishment, and restoration, but it should require BLM to prioritize the use of appropriate native seeds and plants in restoration and land management decisions.

Without prioritizing native seeds and plants, restoration efforts may weaken long-term land health.

- **Remove the interested public from decision-making and reduce the number of actions that will require any public engagement.** I want a voice in the future of America's public lands and what values will guide their management.
- **Remove Land Health Standards from the grazing regulations and treat them as a broader agency goal.** As a result, grazing management would be less directly tied to measurable land health outcomes, reducing accountability when public lands are not meeting standards for healthy soils, vegetation, water quality, and wildlife habitat. Land health should continue to be measured and evaluated for each grazing allotment so that the public can understand what's happening on the ground in specific places.

At a time when the West is facing an unprecedented biodiversity crisis BLM should be strengthening protections for public lands, not reducing transparency and public involvement.
