Talking Points Francis Marion National Forest Escaped Fire Vanilla Bay

December 14, 2005 (For Internal Use Only)

Background: On March 5, 2004, Congressman Henry Brown conducted a prescribed burn on his South Carolina property. The fire escaped from his land onto the Francis Marion National Forest, burning 20 acres. Since then, a legal review of the case has been underway to determine what actions the agency should take to resolve this case and recover costs. Subsequent to the initial legal review, a violation notice was issued to Congressman Brown. These key messages outline agency actions and legal advice in regard to recovery of billable costs for suppression and damages.

Key Message 1:


The Forest Service has issued a bill totaling \$4747 to Rep. Henry Brown, in an effort to recover costs for damages resulting from a fire, which escaped from his property and burned 20 acres of National Forest land.

Talking Points

 This bill follows a violation notice, which was issued to Congressman Brown last September for an escaped fire that burned 20 acres of land on the Francis Marion National Forest.

 This bill for collection includes billable costs for suppressing the fire and damages to resources—in accordance with the agency's regulations and handbook.



 There was, among other findings, a failure to utilize a backing fire and maintain due vigilance over perimeters of the fire. Thus, Mr. Brown is liable for all billable costs.

Key Message 3:

The Forest Service sought a legal review and opinion of this case before taking actions to ensure we consistently and fairly interpreted and applied policies on trespass fires. These legal opinions serve as the basis for actions to issue first a citation and finally a bill to recover costs.

Talking Points

- Based on current laws and regulations, the legal opinion outlines what items should be billed for cost recovery.
- The opinion also includes a thorough review of the investigation reports to ensure our actions take place in accordance with state laws, which differ in cases of trespass fires.

Key Message 4:

It is the agency's policy to seek recovery or repayment of costs of damages that result from trespass or escaped fires.

Talking Points:

- For each case, we take necessary time and effort to fully review cases and ensure consistency and fairness in establishing liability, interpreting and applying policy.
- All reviews and subsequent actions on these cases will take place within the legal statue of limitations of three years.

1/28/05	Recommendation made to the Forest Supervisor on 58 fire related claims for the government based on evaluation by the FMS Trespass fire review team.
1/28/05	Cong. Brown issued bill by FMS for FS suppression costs of \$4747.
1/31/05	Brown submits a claim against the government in the amount of \$9040 for a wildfire that had occurred on NF land and spread to his land in 1989.
2/22/05	The claim was reviewed by OGC and denied because the statute of limitations (2 yrs) had run out.
4/12/05	FMSNF staff met with WO/RO claims personnel and R8 OGC to review 54 fire related claims for the government (same cases reviewed 1/05).

5/19/05	Bryant, Sadler, Crane and Wells met to review cases requiring further investigation. LE to provide additional information for these cases by 6/30/05. A 2 nd request for LE to provide additional information was made
(6)(5)	on 10/14/05. No information has been received to date.
11/21/05	Lynn Mighton migrated 16 cases to ASC claims for billing.
