Dear Judge Holland -

In May 2006, in cooperation with the U.S. government, my Administration presented Exxon Mobil and the Court with a Comprehensive Plan for Habitat Restoration Projects Pursuant to Reopener for Unknown Injury, budgeted to cost \$92,240,982, and subsequently presented Exxon Mobil with a

formal Demand for Payment on August 31, 2006 for the claim. At the same time, we acknowledged that scientific studies were still on going and could affect the claim.

I am aware of the Amicus Curiae brief filed by Professor Richard Steiner asking the court to order this final payment by Exxon to the State and U.S. (3:91-cv-00082-HRH, [346] Motion for Leave to File Amicus Curiae brief filed by Richard Steiner), with oral arguments scheduled for March 4, 2011.

When my Administration submitted the Restoration Plan and demand for payment in August 2006, our experts believed that the Plan would remediate the harms to populations, habitats and species, "which as a result of the oil spill, suffered a substantial loss or substantial decline." Our experts also believed that "the injury giving rise to the loss or decline of a population or habitat could not reasonably have been anticipated in 1991."

Accordingly, by way of this letter, I respectfully suggest that it is in the public interest that the status of the State and Federal governments' scientific studies be made public to determine what, if anything, has changed since the 2006 *Plan* was submitted. Moreover, I further suggest that it is in the public interest that the governments move from continuing study to resolution as soon as practical. Alaska deserves closure on this issue after 22 years.
