Public Use - Recreation Visits
January to May 2003

The National Park Service received 89.9 million recreation visits from

January-May 2003*. The -7.7% decrease in public use was -7.0 million fewer

visits than in 2002. This decrease was not concentrated in any geographic

area but reflect a system wide decrease in visitation. The situation as

described in the April report has not changed other than the negative numbers are getting larger.

73% of the units units) reported a decrease in visitation through the first

five months of the year. The East coast had severe weather in February

resulting in a system decrease of -2.1 million. The War in Iraq in March

distracted Americans from visiting the parks, leading to a one-month

decrease of over -1.6 million visits. April continued the downward trend

with -1.3 million fewer visits while May had -1.9 million fewer visits.

Blue Ridge PKWY and George Washington Mem PKWY have received a combined

-2.5 million fewer visits thru May. The District of Columbia is off by -1.9

million visits with 14 of the 17 units reporting a decrease in visitation.

Virginia had 15 out of 17 units report a decrease (-1.8 million combined).

Eleven of the 13 units in Massachusetts reported a decrease (-.4 million)

combined). Thirteen of the 14 units in Pennsylvania have reported a

decrease in visitation (-.3 million combined).

Cape Hatteras NS (+214,000 YTD), Gulf Islands NS (+187,000 YTD) and San $\,$

Francisco Maritime NHP $(+245,000\ \text{YTD})$ are the fastest growing units of the

NPS. These three units have only a combined +0.6 million more visits than

last year at this time.

The downward trend that began in 2000 is continuing as inclement weather,

global warfare, and especially the uncertain economic conditions are

resulting in a disturbing future for visitation to the NPS. The NPS has had

a total decline of almost 16.8 million recreation visits since January 2000.
